




THAUMATROPE



Create your own thaumatrope. Cut the images on the black line. Fold them in the middle and glue a wooden stick in between. Turn the thaumatrope between your fingers.


What do you see?

THAUMATROPE

If you twirl the thaumatrope fast enough between your fingers, it looks like it's just a single image.

But why is that?

This effect is caused by the so-called "sluggishness of the eye". The retina stores the image for a fraction of a second.

If the next image follows very quickly, the retina has not yet erased the old image.

By the way: this is exactly the effect cartoons make use of. Thaumatrope is therefore often referred to as the precursor of cartoons.
